Remembering former Feeding America President Bob Forney

ess than two weeks after appearing at the Anaheim Convention, longtime Food Drive partner Bob Forney, 69, died of complications from an operation. A former president and CEO of Feeding America—previously known as America's Second Harvest—Forney led the nation's largest hunger-relief charity through its nationwide network of food banks.

"Within that organization, and more importantly, within the nation's entire anti-hunger movement, one of the biggest booster of NALC's efforts was Bob Forney," President Fredric Rolando said in welcoming Forney to the convention.

"It is with great sadness that we extend our thoughts and prayers to the Forney family," Rolando said after



learning of the loss. "We will continue our efforts to work for Bob's dream of a world without hunger."

After retiring from Feeding America, Forney established the Global Food Banking Network to fight hunger throughout the world.

"To all of you," Forney told the thousands of NALC delegates in Anaheim, "and the 20 million people who believe in you and give you that food to bring to 49 million hungry people in America, God bless every one of you."
