helf upon shelf of forms, supplies, clothes and merchandise, three friendly people to ship it, and the means to send it anywhere—the NALC Supply Department has it all.

If you wear a membership pin, or NALC T-shirt, or hat, or have filled out an NALC form or watched a DVD on the history of the 1970 Great Postal Strike, chances are it found its way to you courtesy of the Supply Department's three employees—Janice Caine, Jerry Daniels or James Tilghman—who work in the first-floor office in NALC's Headquarters building in Washington, DC.

Caine, the department's supervisor, has 32 years at Headquarters under her belt, having started at NALC in the cafeteria in 1981. She transferred to the Supply Department about a decade later and then moved to the supervisor position

when the previous supervisor retired. Caine has seen a great increase in the merchandise letter carriers can order to display their union pride.

"Our department has grown a great deal," she said. "We have more items available than we have ever had before."

Letter carriers can buy T-shirts, sweatshirts, jackets, hats, watches, bags, rings, patches and more to proclaim that they are NALC members or to give as gifts. Branches often order such items to recognize exceptional members for their volunteer service to the union. It's a good way for

letter carriers to show off their union or to send a message to the public about the importance of the Postal Service without spending much money.

"We try to keep the items at an affordable price," Caine said. Standard shipping is included in the price.

When enough carriers request new items, the department works with suppliers to provide them. The latest request being worked on is for a hooded sweat-shirt that may be available for purchase soon. The department also sells merchandise at every biennial NALC convention, including items branded for that convention, which are then offered for sale from Headquarters if any remain in stock.

In addition, the Supply Department provides Headquarters, regional and state NALC offices, and branches with many of the essential office items they need, such as forms, steward cards and retiree pins. The department also handles some printing and copying duties.

Caine, Daniels and Tilghman have the equipment to ship everything from Headquarters. They also handle many of the mailing jobs from other departments.

Before coming to NALC, Tilghman worked in several jobs in the Washington, DC, area, but he has spent a happy 10 years at NALC. "I like working here," he said. "I like my boss."

Tilghman enjoys getting to know the staff in Headquarters and letter carriers at branches and NALC offices all over the country as part of his job. Carriers on their first visit to Headquarters often hear his familiar voice and are happy to finally match his face to it, he said, and he enjoys the same experience. Though he doesn't look old enough to be a grandfather, Tilghman loves to spend time after work with his 2-year-old granddaughter, Aubrey, whom he calls "Breezy,"

Like Caine, Daniels started in the NALC cafeteria before working in the Supply Department. He came to NALC in 1993 and also worked as a building guard before moving to the Supply Department 15 vears ago. Daniels and Tilghman are both members of the Office and Professional Employees International Union.

Daniels enjoys working with carriers and learning about their lives and jobs.

"You might take letter carriers for granted when you see them on the street working," he said. "When you learn more, you find out there's a lot more to what they do than just throwing mail around."

"Ianice, Jerry and James are a little like letter carriers," said NALC President Fredric Rolando. "They do their jobs efficiently and with smiles on their faces, but the rest of us don't often stop to think about how important their work is to keeping things running smoothly. Next time you talk to the people in the Supply Department, don't forget to thank them for a job well done."
